Come and get your questions answered... such as:

- What are the pros and cons of the cannabis industry in the City of Guadalupe?
- If implemented, what limits do we want to set?
- How can we keep cannabis out of the hands of our youth?
- Will cannabis business bring unwanted activity to our community?
- Will the cannabis industry affect health and safety?
- What environmental concerns are there?
- How much revenue can the City expect to generate from cannabis taxes and fees?
- Will these revenues be used for City improvements?
- Can we stipulate minimum funding allocation to youth drug education and environmental impact mitigation projects?

On November 8, 2016, California voters passed Proposition 64, also known as the Control, Regulate and Tax Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA), by a vote of 56.1% in favor and 43.9% against. Locally, City of Guadalupe voters accepted Proposition 64 by a vote 54.03% in favor and 45.97% against.

Proposition 64 legalized the nonmedical use of cannabis by persons 21 years of age and over, with certain restrictions, and provides for industry licensing and establishes standards for marijuana products. It allows for state and local regulation and taxation of marijuana businesses. Most of the revenue from such taxes would support youth programs, environmental protection, and law enforcement.

Therefore, the purpose of this workshop is to seek resident feedback in order for the City to determine the reasonable local regulations that our local jurisdiction will enact, should we decide to permit cannabis business in our city.

El 8 de noviembre de 2016, los votantes de California aprobaron la Propuesta 64, también conocida como Ley del Control, Regulación e Impuesto sobre el Use de Marijuana en Adultos (AUMA), con un voto de 56.1% a favor y 43.9% en contra. A nivel local los votantes de la Ciudad de Guadalupe aceptaron la Propuesta 64 con un 54.03% de votos a favor y un 45.97% en contra.

Propuesta 64 legalizó el uso no médico de cannabis por personal de 21 años de edad o más, con ciertas restricciones, y prevé licencias de la industria y estándares establecidos para los productos de marijuana. Permite las regulaciones estatales y locales y los impuestos a los negocios de marijuana. La mayor parte de los ingresos apoyarían los programas para jóvenes, la protección ambiental y el cumplimiento de la ley.

Por lo tanto, el propósito de este taller es buscar comentarios de los residentes para que la Ciudad pueda determinar las regulaciones locales razonables que promulgara nuestra jurisdicción local, en caso de que se decida permitir el comercio de cannabis en la ciudad.
